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Landmark Development on Business Park

A major County Durham industrial scheme has hit another key milestone with the development of its latest phase.

The construction of ten industrial units at Station Place in Newton Aycliffe is well underway, with the groundwork complete and the steelwork of the buildings now being erected.

Station Place is part of the wider £90m Merchant Park industrial scheme in Newton Aycliffe - a 65-acre development at Aycliffe Business Park, located off J59 of the A1(M) and home to Hitachi Rail Europe.

The new £4.8 million scheme on Site 2 at Merchant Park is set to provide 50.333 sq ft of new industrial space to support new and expanding businesses in Newton Aycliffe. It will create 130 jobs and is due to be complete in April 2022.

Durham County Council is supporting the development of the industrial units after agreeing to a 35-year-lease at Station Place in September 2019.

The units will be managed by Business Durham, the business support service of the council. The development is being delivered in partnership with Merchant Anglo and Rokeby Developments. Station Place is part of Avcliffe Business Park, which is the largest industrial park in the North East, home to a wide range of wellestablished businesses and next to Hitachi Rail Europe.

Geoff Hunton, director at Merchant Anglo, said: "We are seeking to address the shortfall of modern fit for purpose units in Newton Aycliffe to support new and growing business in conjunction with our partners Business Durham. We are delighted that the buildings are now emerging out of the ground ready for occupation by early summer next year. Despite all the challenges of the last two years, we are now receiving real enquiries from local businesses and I am delighted that we will shortly be able to welcome them to Station Place".

Newton Aycliffe hope to finally return to action this weekend with a trip to Thornaby in the Ebac Northern League, It's been a long layoff for Brian Atkinson's men who last played on 18th December. There were no games scheduled over the Christmas and New Year period with three postponements following the planned resumption. The league game at Newcastle Benfield on 5th



January was postponed due to Covid while last Saturday's match at home to Billingham Town fell victim to a frozen pitch. Meanwhile the Northern League have decided to delay their Cup competitions as the Brooks Mileson League Cup tie against Horden was also called off.

Aycliffe will be aiming to complete a treble over Thornaby having beaten them in the FA Cup and League 4-3 and 3-1 respectively. They will be wary, however, of striker Adam Burnicle who moved from Moore Lane to Thornaby last month and will no doubt be keen to score against his old club.

Vulnerable Households to Benefit from Winter Support

A North East council will be providing support to vulnerable households to help with energy and food costs this winter.

Durham County Council is set to receive £4.6 million from the government's Household Support Fund to help struggling households with their essential costs over the winter months.

Cobblers Hall Village Centre Burn Lane, Newton Aycliffe Tel: (01325) 319519 The support will be given to residents in County Durham that are most in need through to March 2022, with a minimum of 50 per cent of the funding to be given to vulnerable families with children. The funding is intended to assist financially vulnerable residents with essential costs such as food, energy and water bills, clothing, and utilities.

The council and key partners will be issuing this support in a variety of forms, including food vouchers to households with free school meal eligible children, distributed periodically over the winter months from now until March, and hampers to vulnerable households identified by council support services. There will also be various other schemes where social care and other professionals will be able to make referrals to target further support for vulnerable households. This can be used to help purchase essential household items, cover the cost of boiler services or repairs, provide vouchers for food or fuel, or support with other essentials. Support will be provided to households identified through the council's adult and children's services teams, Housing Solutions, the Discretionary Benefits team, and by working with schools and partners across the county.

Clir Alan Shield, Durham County Council's Cabinet member for equality and inclusion, said: "We know the winter months can be especially difficult for many households. However, it is essential that families have enough food and energy, and we hope this provision of vouchers and support helps relieve that pressure.

"This funding builds on previous Covid winter and local support funds that have been in place to try to alleviate the pressure on vulnerable families and disadvantaged households.

"As with our previous approaches in supporting families, we are working with schools and all our voluntary sector partners to ensure this much-needed support is provided to those in most need."

20 is Plenty

Dear Sir,

I was interested to read the article in last weeks Newton News by John Snowball. The first point I would like to raise is the hatched markings down the centre of the Road on the A167, after the Duel carriageway up to Aycliffe Village. The hatched markings are there as a traffic separate and do not make it illegal to cross them to overtake slow moving vehicles, as they have a broken line border. Regarding the need to do 60mph is neither compulsory nor a target speed. Also there are a number of vehicles that are restricted to 50mph on a single carriageway and aren't allowed to go over 60mph on dual carriageways, such as LGVs, buses/coaches, vehicles towing a trailer and one that a lot of drivers don't realise, vans that are not derived from cars, such as transit size vans or larger. Mr. Snowball admitted himself that a lot of the time you can't travel at speeds of 50mph on the proposed section of road, so why does he object to it as it won't effect his overall travel time and if it does, it wouldn't be by much. Solution, start your journey earlier, just as you should in bad weather.

One thing I would like to add, is that I would support 20mph, especially where there are schools, children's play areas, some housing estates/streets. I'd like to hear other peoples views on this.

Major Recruitment Drive Launched by Durham Constabulary

A major drive to recruit new officers to one of the top-performing police forces in the country begins this week.

Applications to join Durham Constabulary as a police constable opened on Monday 10th January with potential new recruits having until 5pm on Monday, January 24th to submit their application.

The force is opening applications for those interested in joining the constabulary through the Police Constable Degree Apprenticeship (PCDA) and the Degree Holder Entry Programme (DHEP) schemes, as part of the Government's pledge to recruit 20,000 new officers.

Under the degree apprenticeship, student officers will study towards a degree in Professional Policing Practice through Northumbria University while working as a frontline officer, splitting their time between practical, on-the-job training and classroom-based learning. Students will be paid officers from day one, with a starting salary of £24,780, which eventually rises to £41,130, and university fees will be paid for by the force.

The DHEP is for applicants who already have a degree in any subject area. Applicants will spend two years working as a frontline officer while working towards a graduate diploma in Professional Policing Practice.

<u>The County Council of Durham</u> (B6444 Heighington Lane, Aycliffe) (Temporary Road Closure) Order 2022

The Council on 7/1/22 made the above Order under the Road Traffic Regulation Act, 1984 as amended, Section 14 (1) to prohibit all vehicular traffic from proceeding on 75 metres of B6444 Heighington Lane, Aycliffe from the junction with Station Road westwards to the entrance to Heighington Station car park to enable essential rail track inspection works to be undertaken. Alternative route will be available from the eastern side of the closure from B6444 Heighington Lane south easterly on B6444 St Andrews Way to A167 then southerly to A1(M) Junction 59 (Aycliffe) Interchange, south westerly on A1(M) to Burtree Interchange (J58) then northerly along A68 and A6072 to the roundabout junction with B6444 leading to the western side of the closure, and vice versa. A local (non-HGV) diversion will be signed from the eastern side of the closure, northerly via Spring Road and Whinbank Road, left onto Horndale Avenue then south westerly along School Aycliffe Lane to the A6072 roundabout junction with B6444 to the western side of the closure and vice versa. The maximum duration of the Order is 18 months. The proposed works are to commence from 10pm on 20/1/22 and are anticipated to be completed by 6.30am on 21/1/22. On occasions, alternative dates for closure may be necessary and these will be signed accordingly.

The new cycle path along the A167 has caused huge disruption to many thousands of road users over many weeks for a cycle route very few people are likely to use, many of whom would previously have ridden on the path or the road, as I would. Now the road surface is shot, probably exacerbated by the heavy plant used to build the cycle path, and it needs resurfacing. We have a super smooth cycle way very few people will use and a busted up road that vast numbers have to use!

The Council also plans two new junctions on the A167 to encourage a vast new housing development planned for the fields running from the Approved School to the Gretna. This, combined with the lights recently introduced at the Forest Park junction (the timing which will only get worse as more businesses arrive) and the planned speed limit reduction, will make it even slower for motorists to get to and from the A1 or Darlington and very significantly worsen the existing congestion on the A167. I guess they will resurface the road at the same

The disruption to traffic during the work will be hellish and very lengthy. The old path, where they built the cycle way, was poorly maintained by the Council, sections being overgrown by hedging it failed to cut. Sure the path needed attention, but this 5M wide cycle route looks like a classic case of wasting taxpayers' money for political reasons. I would guess that the climate/environmental gain from this will never catch up with the huge environmental cost of building it and the loss of the grass verge it had covered.

The Council also appears to have a policy of digging up paving-slabbed paths, which have withstood all weathers since the town was built, apart from a few getting cracked or requiring evening out, and replacing them with tarmac, which cracks, wrinkles and becomes bumpy with the heat and cold. The new path opposite St Mary's school has already started cracking after a year or so. How was this best use of taxpayers' money? Meanwhile the badly damaged visibility bollards along Pease Way I reported several times dating back several years, to councillors and the council officer responsible, still haven't been repaired and are an eyesore. We recognise our patients can be met with frustrating long telephone queues and experience difficulties acquiring an appointment. The new changes, commencing Monday 24 January 2022, will help to alleviate both challenges, improving your access.

We are adopting a total triage appointment model which means every request for a GP appointment will be triaged by a GP the same day (if received before 5pm). During the day our GPs will review your medical issue, decide the next step in your care, through advice or arranging a further consultation (telephone or face-to-face appointment), which will be communicated back to you via one of our reception team.

You can request an appointment in two ways, electronically or by calling us. There are two ways of submitting electronic requests. You can go to our website homepage and click on the eConsult banner if the request is for you alone. Alternatively, you can use the NHS App to submit an electronic submission by clicking the 'Ask Your GP For Advice' option. When using the NHS App you can also submit a request for your child. Consultations take between five and ten minutes to complete and will be reviewed the same day by our triaging GP (if submitted before 5pm). You can submit an



electronic consultation during the following days and times: Monday to Friday, 7.30 to 11:59am, 1-5pm and 7-8pm (outside of this the service will not be available). There may be times when eConsult does not let you continue your consultation and may ask you to phone into the surgery normally to address a potential urgent requirement. Alternatively, you can continue to call our receptionists but this should be used as a last resort and on behalf of someone else. Our receptionists will ask you a series of guestions and then submit your consultation

to the triaging doctor to assess the next

step in your care. If you do decide to use

the telephone method you increase the risk of continuing to experience long waits. Telephone enquiries will continue to be open from 8am - 6pm as it is now. Ultimately, the new model offers you the opportunity to access our services throughout the day, receive a response about your care the same day and avoid the 'bottleneck' at 8am. Waiting in a queue for appointments will now be a choice for most and we hope to eliminate legacy models that ask patients to try day after day to try and acquire an appointment. We look forward to 24th January 2022 whilst we continue to strive to make our surgery a better patient experience.

Dear Sir,

There is an important ongoing consultation on draft master plans for settlements in County Durham, one being Newton Aycliffe. Details are on the durham.gov.uk website under consultations (responses to spatialpolicy@durham.gov.uk by 14 January).

The draft focuses on the town centre, but does not offer strategic solutions, only some potential projects. As with the recent town centre facelift project, none of these address the underlying issues. The town centre was designed to fulfil the needs of its residents and was never intended to be a regional shopping or leisure hub, like Darlington or Bishop Auckland, both within easy travelling distance. It is essential to recognise this as a reality.

The draft identifies as a disadvantage that the town centre is 'inward facing'. Most buildings date back to the earliest days of the town and are functionally obsolete. Many businesses have failed, due mainly to new and bigger entrants, cost base (rent and rates) being too high, or generally falling high street demand due to retail parks and the internet. The big advantage of our town centre is easy access, which has been compromised by closure of the main car park. This enabled shoppers to park freely, close to the 'high street' shops and under cover in inclement weather.

Tesco and Aldi have adjacent free car parks allowing shopping to be easily transported by trolley to a car. They appear to be thriving and both are located in new purpose built buildings, not pigeon-holed into older units.

The draft talks about moving the Bewick Crescent doctors' surgery and having other unspecified development in place of the multi storey car park, the adjacent car park opposite the care home, and the block of shops and offices housing the former Nat West branch, and also developing the Bewick Crescent car park. Where would people park to access the doctors' surgery and town

centre? There are now dedicated car parks right outside the current surgeries, and there is a strong argument for keeping the surgeries out of the town centre, one essential requisite being the facility to drop off immobile people right outside the door, another to have an adjacent car park and proximity to a bus stop.

What is the coherence of demolishing one block and leaving the others? If there is a strong case for demolishing this block, there has to be a strong case for demolishing the others and having a phased rebuild of the entire town centre.

The draft refers to creating a leisure zone to improve the evening economy opposite Lyon Walk. This 'evening economy' was discussed in producing the neighbourhood plan, and was not welcomed by many people. Aiming to attract young revellers into the town centre next to an area predominantly of OAPs might not be a great idea. Revellers can go to Darlington or Bishop Auckland, where the infrastructure and police presence are more geared up and such businesses are already established.

The Government is pushing cycling and walking, but the vast majority of essential shopping is done from a car, and much of the rest involves a taxi. Very low volumes of shopping are done by walkers or cyclists. The draft refers to improving links to the town centre by improving the network of cycling and walking routes. I see no prospects of such an approach making a significant difference to town centre trade, whereas reducing and distancing parking will almost certainly adversely affect it. Newton Aycliffe is a new town designed in the age of the car and is too spaced out to expect significant numbers of people to use cycling or walking as their main means of getting around, especially when it involves carrying shopping. This is a reality which the authors have overlooked or ignored.

Another big issue, overlooked by the draft plan, is increasing congestion associated with unrelenting house building and population growth. The County declared a climate emergency, but continues to destroy green field areas by building yet more housing on it. I strongly believe that a line should be drawn on building on green field sites, including the proposed 1,400 dwellings at Copelaw, which will destroy prime farm land and reduce connectivity by further increasing congestion on the A167, by extra volume and by requiring another two junctions on it. The NPPF points towards consideration of residential housing in town

centres. If the space isn't demanded for other uses, and there is a demand from DCC to accommodate more people, why has this not been considered as an option? Much better to build on brown field than on green field.

Volunteers Needed to Join Council's Committees

Residents can play a part in helping to shape council services in County Durham.

Durham County Council is looking for volunteers to serve on its overview and scrutiny committees as non-statutory, non-voting cooptees.

Two volunteers are needed for each of the council's five overview and scrutiny committees: adults, wellbeing and health; safer and stronger communities; economy and enterprise; children and young people's; and environment and sustainable communities.

Co-optees serve for two years and have the opportunity to help develop new ways of working, review existing policies and challenge the performance of the authority and its key partners.

They will also have the opportunity to participate in focused reviews, with previous review topics including cybercrime, suicide rates, mental health and wellbeing in County Durham, support provided to the retail sector by the council, GP service provision, free school meals and holiday hunger, the authority's proposed allotment policy and road safety.

There are six scheduled meetings each year, starting at 9.30am and usually finishing around 11.30am.

Successful applicants would need to have access to IT and the internet to be able to participate in any meetings that may be held virtually.

Tom Bolton, who currently serves as a non-voting co-optee on the environment and sustainable communities overview and scrutiny committee, said: "I've always had an interest in environmental issues, so being able to attend meetings and take part in projects has allowed me to contribute to the process of improving the services of the council and its partners.

"For me, being involved in overview and scrutiny is about making a positive difference. I have also gained a lot of knowledge during my time as a co-opted member because of my involvement in several in-depth projects.

"The last project involved a review of allotment provision and was fascinating, with site visits and presentations from a wide range

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of providers and users. I was able to ask questions and, I hope, contribute positively to the recommendations of the working group to the council. I have always found that being involved in this work and helping to improve council services has been rewarding."

Students Jessica Rayner, Brooke Dawson and Jodie Shelley were instrumental in setting up the café.



New £5.9m Collection **Building go on Display** at Locomotion



Visitors and the public are invited to have their say on plans for a new £5.9m collection building at Locomotion in Shildon at a free exhibition being displayed this month.

The exhibition will be on show at Locomotion between 19 and 23 January before the plans are submitted for planning approval later in the year. On 19 January (3pm to 7pm), there will also be a face-to-face open session at the museum with members of the project team on hand to answer questions and to explain the plans. A further drop-in session will be held at Shildon Library on 24 January (11am to 3pm).

The 2000m² collection building is expected to open in 2023, ahead of celebrations to mark the bicentenary of the Stockton & Darlington Railway in 2025.

The building is the centrepiece of a programme of improvements taking place at Locomotion as part of the National Railway Museum's 'Vision 2025' masterplan. These include repairs to the site's historic buildings, the display of the original Locomotion No.1 and the relocation of the historically-significant Gaunless

The new building will house up to 45 rail vehicles, in addition to the 87 already on display in the existing collection building, to create one of the world's largest collections of rail vehicles. The development at Locomotion will also provide new opportunities to tell the story of Shildon as the world's first railway town. This will include examples of the exceptional importance of coal to the development of the area and the town's post-war railway history, with several vehicles built in the Shildon Works on

Locomotion opened in 2004 and is part of the Science Museum Group. Prior to the pandemic, the museum received up to 200,000 visitors a year. In December, the museum was awarded the 'Special Recognition Award' at the 2021 County Durham Together Awards for supporting the local community during the pandemic. The museum also received a share of £3.5m regional 'Levelling Up' funding following a successful bid by Durham County Council. This will see upgrades to the visitor car park, assistance with landscaping and further repairs to the historic coal drops. Designed by AOC Architects, the new building at Locomotion was originally due to open in 2022 but was delayed as a result of the

The exhibition will also be displayed at Shildon Library on Monday 24 January (11am to 3pm) and will be available to view online at www.locomotion.org.uk/new-building-locomotion from 19 January

Exhibition dates may be affected by changing Coronavirus restrictions and visitors are advised to check online in advance. All comments on the plans must be received by 31 January. Locomotion is a partnership between the Science Museum Group and Durham County Council, which is a major funder of the museum
