St. Teresa Charity Christmas Tree Collection



Around 65 volunteers from Darlington Rotary Club toured the town in a fleet of vans to take away the festive firs in return for a donation to St. Teresa's Hospice. With donations averaging around £10, a record £16,575 was raised, most of which goes directly to the hospice. The scheme has been running for the past 11 years with trees going to John Wade Recycling for conversion into fertiliser or to specialist arborists Greenworx to be chipped to provide biomass fuel for power stations.

The venture was hosted by Drive Vauxhall, with vans loaned by rental companies Enterprise and Charter, and local firm MT Print. Rotary Club organiser David Hayward said: "This is a win-win venture for everyone. Residents avoid any mess removing their trees and the hospice gains much needed funds following a challenging year."

More than £3m needs to be raised every year to provide free inpatient and community care for residents of Darlington, South Durham and North Yorkshire.

Five Acres Community Garden Eight Months On, Still Going Strong ...

For those readers who haven't heard about Five Acres Community Garden CIC we are a Day Respite Centre for School and College Leavers with Learning Difficulties. Phase 1: We opened in May last year when John & Julie Finley from ROF 59 offered us some rooms to hire in their fantastic Activity Centre. Initially we had only two Members and two Members of Staff - Donna Martin, Centre Manager, and Sam Dawson, first Learning Mentor, both have previous experience in the Special Needs Sector - fast forward to January 2022 and we now have 28 'Champions' and a further 4 full-time Staff Members plus an Apprentice.

We call our members 'Champions' as we feel it gives them empowerment and purpose.

Our ethos is for our Champions to enjoy their day while learning and engaging in activities in preparation for Adulthood. They enjoy Music, Zumba, Craft, Sensory Projects and Fitness Sessions as well as practical activities to help with literacy and numeracy skills. We also go offsite too and visit the local area.

We are on Durham County Councils list of providers for Day Respite and are now a Commissioned Day Service with Darlington Borough Council.

We have forged friendships with other local Community Groups including Community Spirit, Crafters Companion, PCP, All Disability Matters, Aycliffe Radio, CAFÉ JJ's, Morrisons and Middlesbrough FC. We have completed Defib Training with David Sutton Lloyd too and we are part of the 'Keep Aycliffe Tidy' Campaign.

We have a fantastic facility at ROF 59 that can adapt to any occasion and we have held various events such as Party in the Park, Ladies Night and a Christmas Far. We've also hosted a Big Brew Coffee Morning on behalf of SSAFA to raise money for their veterans. We want our Champions to be included in all aspects of our Community and Local Projects.

On 19th August we celebrated our 'Grand Opening' and Paul Howell MP for Sedgefield did the honours of officially opening the Centre. We took on our first Apprentice, Joseph Carrick, who is now enrolled on a Health & Social Care course.

We have received a grant from The Happiness Hub (PCP) for a Polytunnel and Potting Shed. Husgvarna have kindly donated workwear and gardening tools. The Rotary Club have donated Chrome Books for our IT Suite. Tesco sponsor us with Fresh Fruit and Breakfast essentials. Community Spirit have also donated towards Cookery items and Bakeware as in December we joined forces with Mr & Mrs Claus, aka Nev & Jo Jones, and helped with their Santa Tours.

To top off 2021 we were honoured to receive an 'Investing in Children Membership Award' which we are thoroughly proud of. Phase 2 is now underway, an additional Day Centre to run alongside ROF 59 - we intend to create a Community/Sensory Garden to include Horticulture/Agriculture with Respite Lodges at Lime Lane, Brafferton. The Planning Application is now 'live' and can be viewed on the Darlington Borough Council Website - search for 'Planning Applications Online' - Ref No is 21/00753/ FUL.

Penny Motion

This week Liberal Democrats councillors will propose that the Town Council does not increase this years council tax. In the meeting of the Policy and Resources Committee Councillor Michael Stead is set to provide 20 different areas the council can look at to reduce costs. Every single proposal will protect all town council services. Last week, Cllr Stead proposed that discounted beer in the local council run Sports Complex should not be subsidised for by Aycliffe residents. He received a majority vote for plans to review this. This is just one of dozens of suggestions made by local Lib Dems

Cllr Michael Stead says "Charging more appropriate prices for alcohol in the Sports Complex could mean no council tax rise is needed for the town council."

It is unclear if Labour and Independent councillors will support those Lib Dem proposals.

Another savings proposal from the Lib Dems includes cutting the cost of councillors paperwork, by thousands of pounds, by using technology and email instead of by first class post

The Town Council is proposing a 2% increase in council tax.

Great Aycliffe has one of the highest council tax rates in the entire country.

Cllr Lyndsey Aston adds "Local Liberal Democrats feel that, in a time when residents are struggling, local residents should not see council tax rises when it isn't necessary. All of the money which will be raised by the proposed Town Council increase would not be spent. It would be added to the £1 million in the Town Council's reserves.

BARBARA ANNE CLARE (1945-2022)

At first, Barbara Clare did not want to come to Newton Aycliffe. A committed Christian, she told God: "I'll go anywhere for you Lord ... except Newton Aycliffe". It seemed, however, that God had other plans - she came to live in Aycliffe in 1977 and, despite attempts to go and live elsewhere, always ended up back here.

Barbara was born in Bradford, living as a child in Ushaw Street. Desperately ill at the age of ten, she nevertheless managed to go to Bolling Grammar School and (despite leaving with just one 'O' level) worked as an auxiliary nurse and a PA in a Building Society. She became a Christian, married an accountant, adopted two daughters, and seemed destined for a middle-class life as a mother who helped with youth groups and bible groups in a city church ... until 1976 when her husband, who had decided to train to be a vicar, threw it all up and went off with a student, leaving her and her daughters in a student flat in Cranmer Hall, Durham (which, of course, she had to quit).

Thus it was - via a Council house in Bearpark and an exchange to Silverdale she came to live in Aycliffe.

"When I came to Newton Aycliffe in 1977," she said later, "I was a deserted wife with two small children. In Newton Aycliffe I was given a house, friends, a job and a place in the community."

To the end of her life, she campaigned that those days of opportunity might not be taken away from others by governments which did not seem to understand the principles of the Welfare State.

She worked as a finance clerk at Perstorp, and as PA to the director of a construction company. Marrying a local teacher, with family finances stretched, she also, however, to make ends meet, worked as a school cleaner and collected milk money doorto-door. For a time, once a week, she helped out as a volunteer reading coach at Stephenson Way School and then at Greenfield Comprehensive as a Learning Support Assistant.

Barbara was elected as Town Councillor for Woodham in 1995 and then, in 2003-2007, to Sedgefield Borough Council. There, she was appointed Vice Chair of the important Scrutiny 3 Committee, which monitored Council spending, and was proud to represent the Borough on an exchange visit to Rheinhausen in Germany. In the community, she was secretary to the Local Implementation Group for Mental Health, and to the Woodham Community Association, and she also at that time served as a director of the Sedgefield Citizens Advice Bureau. Proud Labour, she was also Assistant Secretary of the Council's Labour Group

In 2009, Barbara suffered a quick succession of serious heart attacks, during which she died and had to be resuscitated, and needed an emergency double by-pass. From that time on, she lived with severe heart failure, which in turn damaged her kidneys and liver. Coming round from an induced coma in intensive care, she would remember seeing people as white shapes with tiny yellow alien



faces ... and determining not to sleep until she had recovered. She resolved to live, and to make the most of her remaining time for her community.

She served as GATC Deputy Mayor and then, in 2013-14, as Mayor of Great Avcliffe. At the start of her year she set herself three objectives: (1) to acknowledge the marvellous people of Great Aycliffe and all that they do, (2) to raise the profile of Great Aycliffe in County Durham, and (3) to build links between the community and the companies on the Business Park. With the help of the Newton News, she was able to accomplish all three, hosting 'at homes' for Aycliffe volunteers, and was particularly delighted with the number of local firms she was able to visit and support, including Formica, Palram and Hitachi. Her chosen charity was the Cardiothoracic Unit at James Cook University Hospital in Middlesbrough, to which she owed her life, and she presented the cheque to the surgeon who had saved her (who was not a little concerned about the amount of work she had done during her year as Mayor!) Barbara was re-elected for Woodham Village in 2017 and again in 2021. After campaigning for a higher profile for women on Great Aycliffe Town Council, she became Vice-Chair of Planning. She served as Secretary to Sedgefield Constituency Labour Party, providing a calming influence during a lively time in the Party's history. Lately, as a medically vulnerable person, she found herself self-isolating for much of the pandemic, but - helped by Bewick Crescent Surgery and the local NHS heart and diabetes teams - actually felt healthier, taking short walks and enjoying breaks at her holiday home in Whitby. Unable to attend church, she found her spiritual needs met by a weekly phone call from Rev Daniel Hudson, which she greatly valued. Last Tuesday, however, she contracted a shortbut-sharp infection, which led to anaemia and - too weak to cope with any medical procedure - her husband by her side - she passed away calmly at Darlington Memorial Hospital at 11pm on Monday 17 January, 2022. (Many thanks to the staff on Wards 34 and 42 for making her so comfortable.) Barbara leaves behind three children and nine grandchildren, and an adoring husband whose comment was that the light has left his life.

Hundreds of lovely posts on Facebook evidence the respect and love of many local people for the lady who was sure God was determined she should live and die in Aycliffe.

Mental Health Issues at the Hub of Veteran's Organisation

With many people experiencing the 'January Blues' with bills from Christmas to pay, bad weather on the horizon and COVID restrictions, mental health issues are increasing throughout the region. The effects of mental health and depression are often more provalent for c

depression are often more prevalent for exservice men and women, some who have PTSD and have spent much of their service lives where everything is organised within their tightly knitted communities. Now, a County Durham organisation for veterans is offering help and support to those in need from their base in Newton Aycliffe.



The Veterans Community Hub was created to help all veterans, and the local community, access a range of services and training. It offers a range of classes as well as a place to meet others in a safe environment. Popular courses include cookery, pottery, furniture restoration, woodworking, vehicle renovation and art. In addition, as a service to the community, healthy, nutritious meals are cooked on site and delivered to families in the area needing extra support. Ex RAF officer and Hub manager David Routledge explained how the organisation worked:

"We've brought together a group of like-minded people who have their own companies who help veterans with their own specialist skills. We are all under one roof which helps us to provide a seamless welfare and training package for the people who come to us. It means that we can all identify people who need additional support and either direct them to our in-house experts or to external help."

A new addition to the hub is the counselling and therapy provision which is run by ex-army nurse Donna Murray. Donna is a qualified therapist offering counselling and life coaching. She is supported by a team of therapists who also offer mental health awareness and suicide prevention training.

Donna is particularly interested in helping those who fall into a hardto-reach category including LGBT, the homeless, disabled people, and females.

"Help for male veterans is very well funded and supported yet a lot of women veterans face barriers when accessing support. The armed services are traditionally a very male focused environment and there is still a culture of people not admitting that they have a mental health problem. What my team is doing is trying to talk to these people to see if they need our help."

As well as offering a drop in facility at the Hub, Donna has worked with her colleagues to provide a joined-up outreach service using a mini bus. The bus is equipped with a seating area for chats and refreshments and healthy meals cooked in the Hub can also be served. In addition, a hairdresser will be onboard as well as facilities for veterans to tell their stories on a video camera which can then be replayed back to others. The bus is nicknamed 'Bluey' after the communications notes used in the military and will operate from Helmsley in Yorkshire up to Northumberland.

"We're very aware that NHS waiting lists for mental health cases are very long and we aim to help people' who see us at the Hub' within a week. Some of the activities and complementary therapies we do here can have a positive effect very quickly such as listening to music, creative arts such as painting and pottery and getting involved in a woodworking project. We then offer psychological support, but everything is at the pace needed by the individual," said Donna.

David Routledge added: "In the short time since August that we've been open, we've helped countless veterans in many ways. The advantage we have here is that everyone has served in one of the armed forces and we have a shared understanding and empathy which has been invaluable."

Work Begins on New Transition Unit at Children's Home

Work is underway to create a new unit at a secure children's home in County Durham to help support young residents when they leave the centre. Following an announcement from the Government that it is investing an



initial £12million to create new places in secure children's homes, construction has started at Aycliffe Secure Children's Home, in Newton Aycliffe, to create a new 'step-down' place. The area will support children to move out of secure accommodation safely and back into the community when they are ready to do so. It will also create more than 20 new skilled jobs.

Aycliffe provides high-quality, specialist accommodation for young people between the ages of 10 and 18, many of whom have complex problems and need intensive support to help them turn their lives around. Accommodation is available for up to 38 young people, who have either been sentenced or remanded by the Youth Custody Service or are accommodated for their own or others safety under Section 25 of the Children's Act 1989 and are commissioned by local authorities.

There is a requirement for a new transition unit at Aycliffe to address the difficulties that young people often face when leaving a secure environment to go out into the general community. This can be particularly difficult if children leave to reside in an unfamiliar area that is in a different location to their previous home environment.

The new unit will allow access to school, college or apprenticeships whilst enabling children to live in a safe environment with access to support and staff whom they have come to trust. It will provide four en suite bedrooms for young people - all at ground floor overlooking the centre's courtyard – as well as two secure staff sleep-in rooms and a staff office and meeting room.

Work on the unit is expected to be completed by September 2022, with children who currently live at the home remaining there throughout the build process.

The creation of the new transition unit comes after Aycliffe Secure Children's Home retained its position as an 'Outstanding' centre following an inspection by Ofsted in November 2021. The home has been rated as Outstanding since 2019.

During the latest visit, inspectors found that "children continue to enjoy warm and supportive relationships with staff. These relationships help them to develop trust in the people who care for them. Consequently, the children are able to reflect on their life experiences and establish positive strategies to deal with challenges. This helps children to move forward with hope and confidence."

The report added: "Partnership working between managers, staff and other professionals who support the children is extremely effective. This helps staff to collaborate closely and to implement care plans which promote and protect each child's welfare. "It is very clear that members of staff know the children well and know how each child prefers to be supported and nurtured. As a result, children continue to make good progress because they live in this home."

Aycliffe Secure Children's Home is currently looking for people to join its team in a challenging and rewarding career with real opportunities to change young people's lives. There are a range of roles available including daytime and night-time residential workers, case workers, educational staff and house managers. Hi everyone, PCSO Steven Kipling here for your weekly update, hope this finds you all well.

On Wednesday 19th January the local Neighbourhood Team had a visit from our Police and Crime Commissioner, Joy Allen and two of her colleagues. Lots was discussed about moving forwards and how we will work more closely in the future with regards to important issues such as Anti-Social Behaviour, which we know our residents really care about.

On Monday 17th, myself and PCSO Middleton responded to a report of shoplifting in the Town Centre. Within minutes, we located the two suspects who had numerous stolen items on them and detained them. They were then taken back to Newton Aycliffe station by colleagues from Response, where they were interviewed and admitted to six shoplifting offences.

Moving onto youth related Anti-Social Behaviour in and around the town centre, we have identified a number of youths found to be causing ASB around the Leisure Centre, and working together with our partners from the ASB team from Durham County Council these youths will be started on our ASB escalation process, which aims to reduce their offending going forward.

Furthermore, a number of youths were in Court last week, where we submitted an application for a Criminal Behaviour Order for one youth. Another youth was found to have breached his own Criminal Behaviour Order on a number of occasions, this youth now has an electronic tag which means he must stay in their address between the hours of 8pm-7am.

Also, our colleagues on Response executed a warrant on Wednesday 19th at an address in Arncliffe Place, Newton Aycliffe under the Misuse of Drugs Act. A male has been arrested and enquiries are ongoing in relation to this.

Finally, if you have a spare minute, please consider signing up to "Keep in the Know", which is our online messaging service where can send out local alerts to keep you up to date of what is happening in the local area. It's a completely free service, and you can receive regular crime updates, road closure updates and you can see what the Newton Aycliffe Neighbourhood Team is up to. more of these beautiful creatures. To update on Mitzi, doing well and growing stronger everyday but still has some spines yet to come through but there is still some time to go before the weather changes for the better and they can be released. One thing I can say is that just because these are wild animals they still feel ill, they come in with all sorts of problems, feel the cold, pain, etc etc and us rescuers see it all. I have even seen a hog with tears because he was safe and comfy here. They have a lot to contend with in the wild and we are responsible for some of the bad things that happen to them and I see them as vulnerable, not wild in the slightest. Here is an example of a brilliant rescue, on Sunday a lovely couple brought a lovely hog in who was clearly in distress, out in the day time, which never should happen to nocturnal mammals. She had woken up hungry, thirsty and disoriented from hibernation. Jane and Selwyn picked up this hog and took her indoors and warmed her through then sought my help.

She is very thin but healthy, but what is astonishing is that she isn't a young hog, she is maybe 5 years old considering the awful things they have to put up with in the wild. All hoggies in here are very special in their individual way because we have to work hard to keep them alive. But, here she is, Jane and Selwyn have named her Molly! Settling well and gaining weight too, she likes Brambles Hedgehog Meat. Can I also mention another lady who is always on hand to help us rescuers, Katrina, and her mum, another lady called Jane. She always watches out for our prickly pals, so thank you. All help and donations are very much appreciated, I try to graciously accept because it's all voluntary and helps me feed

After several weeks of not being successful in any draws and only getting questions by bobbing in the chamber, this week I have drawn two. Saturday 15th January 2022 Ebac Northern League Division One Thornaby 0 v Newton Aycliffe 2


