

Aycliffe continued to dominate and created several half chances that they either flashed wide or the keeper saved. At the other end the defence was restricting Consett to shots from distance. Then, on the stroke of half time, Jack Mortimer beat one defender before sitting the keeper down and slotting home. HT 3-0. Aycliffe continued in the same vein and totally dominated the game and created chances galore, 10 minutes into the second half we started to make changes to get the whole squad involved in the cup final. Sabre Rail Litter Pick



Emma's Swimming Success

Woodham Academy Year 9 student, Emma Price, has had a successful career so far in swimming. She joined the local swimming club Sedgefield 75 Swimming Club just before turning 9 years old. Emma's success started in the first competition she attended at 9 years old, where she won 8 gold medals. This was a gold in every event that she was entered into. Since then, Emma has gone on to win 179 medals overall. This breaks down to 7 medals at Northeast Regionals, 21 medals at Northumberland and Durham Swimming Championships (N&D's), 101 of them being gold medals.



Emma has also been the 200m Freestyle Champion 3 times (2019, 2020, 2022) at the N&D's and has a total of 81 club records. She has also spent time as the British number 1 in the 800m Freestyle. In early December 2021, Emma swam in her first national competition at the Swim England Winter Nationals. This is where she competed against Olympian Abbie Wood, in the 400m Freestyle. Emma took home a silver medal in the 400m and 200m Freestyle and a Bronze in the 100m Butterfly. Emma's remarkable success at this competition was taking home the gold in the 800m Freestyle. Due to her dedication and hard work Emma has been part of development programmes and is currently on the Northumberland and Durham Performance Pathway programme which includes weekly training sessions with other top Northeast swimmers. Recently Emma has been selected for the phase 2 of Swim England's National Development Programme.

Emma is aiming to qualify for the Swim England Summer Nationals. In addition to this she has also taken part the swimming clubs recent sponsored swim 'Swim for Ukraine'.

Emma's Head Coach, John Moore at Sedgefield 75 Swimming Club, said, "Emma is a superb athlete who shows great ability, attitude and attendance which has been a major factor in her outstanding success to date." Assistant Coach and PE teacher, Miss Leybourne, said, "Emma is an outstanding member of the swimming club who is looked up to by many other swimmers. She is dedicated and driven and will go on to have amazing success, due her attitude and talent." Woodham Academy wishes Emma all the best in her upcoming competitions and cannot wait to see what the future holds for this talented athlete.


Woodham Academy Promotes Science Week

After this I went to Durham where, along with other local MPs and the Durham County Council Bid team, we had lunch with Lord Parkinson, who is the Minister responsible for the City of Culture programme. We were able to share with him what an amazing County we have and the benefits winning the bid for City of Culture 2025 would bring to our region. We then all travelled down to Shildon for another presentation at the Locomotion railway museum. He appeared genuinely impressed by our offer but of course needs to remain impartial. The judging team were following him to the region this week so let's hope they are impressed enough to award us the title for 2025.

Over the weekend I had another trip up to Northumbria University, this time for a Students Ball that included myself and other MPs taking questions in a Q&A session. Quite a challenging experience! This week sees us back in Westminster for the Queen's Speech. As reported in the media on Monday evening the Queen will not attend the state opening of parliament as she continues to experience mobility problems. I am sending my heartfelt best wishes to Her Majesty. This will be the first time since 1963 that the Queen will have missed this constitutional ceremony, which sets out the government's legislative plans. Buckingham Palace have said that the Prince of Wales would read the Queen's Speech on her behalf. Prince Charles, who is taking on the head of state's big constitutional duty for the first time, will open parliament on Tuesday 10th May with the Duke of Cambridge. I am fortunate to have drawn seats in the Strangers' Gallery of the House of Lords so I will have an excellent view of proceedings. As this column is submitted on Tuesday I will talk more about this next week. I also have the privilege of attending a garden party at Buckingham Palace on Wednesday. You will have seen in the press that the Queen will miss this year's royal garden parties, so it will be interesting to see which members of the Royal Family are there.

My plans for the Jubilee weekend are coming together nicely and I hope as many of you as possible can join in some of the celebrations of our Queen's amazing 70 years on the throne.



50mph Reduction on the A167

Dear Sir, I was dismayed to read our MP expressing pleasure at the speed limit reduction on the A167 to only 50mph. I strongly objected to this with cogent arguments but Durham County Council (DCC) did it anyway. Our MP mentioned his friend was killed on this road in the 70's, but not that it was 'made safer' since then, with

white diagonal lines eliminating most overtaking and the Gretna junction being changed (I recall a car colliding with a temporary safety barrier during this work, causing a fatality, ironically). DCC counted 14,000 vehicles per day on the road, virtually all being motorised. DCC is building a 5m cycle path (which taxpayers now have to maintain) and introduced it and the reduced

This next admission is a little more upsetting, I received a phone call from Dave, he said his wife Sue was playing golf and discovered a poorly hedgehog out on the fairway, it was suggested that he or she be left there for nature to take its course, of course Sue and her husband sent for me immediately. We went to find this hedgehog which is in fact a beautiful little girl, the poor soul hurt not only one of her paws but all of them, they are so swollen. Should she have met with a predator she couldn't defend herself. It doesn't bear thinking about what her demise would have been had Sue left her out there, cold, alone, hungry and defenceless, firstly the flies would have laid their eggs on her, which hatch into maggots, they eat their host, dead or alive, then we have crows and magpies that would also have had a peck at her, etc, etc. A massive thank you to Sue and Dave, she is here, comfy and warm, out of harms way and is on antibiotics for her wounds, time, warmth, love and care is now essential.

Can I remind readers that it is a criminal offence to be cruel to a wild animal, leaving her, as suggested, would have been cruel, these precious creatures do no harm, what has happened here is she was hungry, the ground has been hard, no rain so no food, she didn't deserve such hostility, she wanted to eat, that's all! She has food in abundance here with me, my family and other poorly hedgehogs, please wish her good health.

All our rescuers work hard and tirelessly to help these lovely mammals, devotion is limitless, also tears are shed when we lose one, we see the harder part of their existence, all we ask is to show them kindness.

Tip of the week, should you find a hedgehog out during the day he or she needs help quickly, please ring The British Hedgehog Preservation Society on 01584 890801, They are a protected and endangered species let's all help them. Thank you. limit irrespective of objections, which they clearly regarded as a nuisance to be shot down rather than anything they were going to take notice of.

This work has gone on for many months, at a snail's pace, for a tinv number of pedestrians and tinier number of cyclists, inconveniencing huge numbers of vehicle users. What a disarace! There are government guidelines for imposing below national speed limits and I believe they were not satisfactorily met. DCC implied the road was disproportionately unsafe with seven accidents in five vears! This is statistically quite average. It is not a statistically unsafe road. In fact, I observed one accident myself after the 50 limit was introduced, indicating the road is statistically more unsafe now than it was before! Details of the seven accidents were not freely available from DCC, reflecting an attitude not welcoming to public scrutiny. DCC relied on average speeds being 48mph - oddly, the guidelines say that if average speeds are below the limit, councils can (not must or should) reduce the limit. DCC did not properly recognise that average speeds on this road are severely distorted by rush hour iams making it impossible to reach speeds anywhere near the national limit. Will they increase it back if everyone exceeds the limit? I think not! The A167 might well be safer with a 50 limit, but not as safe as with a 40 limit, or 30 or 20, or if they just banned cars altogether! These are varying degrees of interference by a 'nanny state', and it's dispiriting

swimmers gathered sponsorship to see how many lengths of the Newton Aycliffe pool they could swim in a 40-minute period. The children themselves had come up with the idea and were determined to get in as many lengths as they could, to maximise the funds raised. Everyone did themselves and the group effort proud in totting up an enormous number of lengths and raising well over £2000 for UNICEF's Children of Ukraine fund. The regional swimming championships took place across the country over two weekends in April and May. England is split into eight swimming regions, the North East region covering Yorkshire and Northumbria. Two versions of the championships take place, the age group for 12-14 year olds held at the John Charles Centre in Leeds and the open championships with youth (16/under) and senior categories held at Ponds Forge in Sheffield. Two swimmers

achieved the tough qualifying times for the age groups with Emma Price entering eight events and Filip Wilczynski five. Qualifying heats were held during the day for early evening finals sessions to decide the medals. Filip managed to qualify for all his five finals and picked up three medals, bronzes in 100m backstroke and 50m butterfly where there was the unusual occurrence of three swimmers sharing bronze as they all posted the same time! It was in 50m backstroke that Filip struck gold and took the title. Emma got into five of

seven possible finals and won two silvers, in 400m freestyle and in 200m individual medley with a good PR

In between the two weekends at Leeds were the Open Championships where again two swimmers took part. Alex Boyer swam 800m freestyle where he took over a second from his PB and Emma Price competed again and swam two individual events, 100m freestyle and 400m individual medley. She qualified for the medley final with a five-second PB but then went five seconds faster again in the final to gain a bronze despite still being 13 and swimming against 16-year-olds. Emma was also selected to represent Northumberland and Durham in three relay teams at the open event and she played her part in a thirdplaced finish in the 4 x 200m freestyle team.
