# "Ashamed of Living Here" Working Together to

My letter is in response to the overpowering smell enveloping Newton Aycliffe on a regular basis and reported by Mrs A Proud last week. I know many in Newton Aycliffe don't notice the problem, but that really is due to a person's proximity to the business park. If you live anywhere near the border of the park, you can't possibly have failed to notice this issue.

I reported this smell to the environmental health department quite a while ago and they supposedly looked into it and came back with no definitive answer as to which business is responsible. We do. however, have a Biogas business on the business park that deal with recycling food waste etc. Look up Biogas producers in Newton Aycliffe and you will find them. There is no certainty that the odour is coming from there, however it would seem to 'fit'. Though obviously there may well be others that are also contributing to this issue. I was told that this particular company receives very few complaints therefore the environmental agency and this Biogas company feel there is nothing to be done - I beg to differ!

The smell does appear to be particularly bad at night right now, so perhaps the environmental people HAVE identified the culprit and perhaps believe that operating at night time will be less invasive for the residents. Well, I agree wholeheartedly with Mrs Proud, that it's truly awful, at any time. The smell of rotting food and flesh is totally unacceptable and needs to be dealt with. I too have found it impossible to have windows open at night, even during the heatwave we experienced, due to the foul odour coming into my property. Sitting in one's own garden has become unbearable at times too, usually on an evening. We get precious little pleasant weather, but this odour issue prevents us ordinary people enjoying our own little areas for relaxation.

I wonder perhaps that the environmental officers do their 'checks' at the wrong times. They need to be monitoring these emissions at random times of day AND night over a lengthy period of time, as the culprits may be operating only when they know they are not being monitored and therefore avoid being identified.

I have been close to vomiting with the smell, when walking close to the business park. No-one should ever feel that ill from odours emitted from supposedly 'green businesses', I literally was green! I implore Aycliffe councillors, and anyone who else who has any official 'clout' in Aycliffe, to step in and try to identify the culprits, 'name and shame them' and get the problem dealt with once and for all, before Newton Aycliffe becomes a 'no go area' for comfortable residential living. I don't want to feel ashamed of living here! Mrs Wills



# Championships



Last week the top domestic age-grouped swimming competition took place at Ponds Forge International Sports Centre in Sheffield as the best swimmers from all over Britain, representing over 300 clubs, competed at the British Summer Championships.

The top 24 ranked swimmers in each event were invited to attend and Emma Price, of Sedgefield 75 swimming club in Newton Aycliffe, had qualified for six events during the qualifying window earlier this year. She was also selected to represent Northumberland and Durham Swimming Association in two team relay events. She kicked off the competition on Friday 22nd with a 4 x 200m freestyle team race where she teamed up with 16-year-old swimmers from Sunderland, Stockton and Morpeth, despite being only 14, and swam the third leg beating her own 200m freestyle PB by two seconds and moving the team up from eighth to fifth place. The team just missed out on a medal, finishing in fourth place.

200m freestyle was her first individual race and she matched her time from Friday to qualify for the final where she finished fifth. She also made the final of the 400m individual medley and finished ninth. It was 800m freestyle on Sunday which was to be decided by a single heat swim. Emma pushed herself very hard and swam 9:19, 8.5 seconds faster than her PB and it left her in first place with three swimmers to come. Unfortunately the three swimmers beat the time and Emma finished fourth again. Wednesday and it was now 400m freestyle and 200m individual medley. Emma dominated her 400 free heat from start to finish beating her PB by over six seconds to qualify fourth fastest for the final. In the final, she went faster again but missed out on bronze by less than a second.

On the final day, Emma swam 100m butterfly and in 4 x 100m freestyle team relay. The same team that had swam the 200m relay broke four minutes in gualifying for the final, Emma swimming a 60.17 second leg, more than a second faster than her 100m freestyle PB. In the final, Emma took the first leg but the team were unable to improve on their heat time and finished eighth.

Although slightly frustrating to finish fourth three times, a superb performance to be this highly ranked in the whole of Britain and a credit to the coaching available at the town's swimming club, www.sedgefield75.com

He will be visiting Roman Showers on the Business Park following the brilliant news about their second Queen's Awards for Enterprise for International Trade. I have also arranged for him to meet local farmers and the NFU to discuss the opportunities arising from the trade deals being negotiated.

I had the pleasure of opening the NMI (National Microelectronics Institute) conference at Ramside Hall which brought together businesses from the semiconductor market both from across our region and the rest of the UK. The other reason I attended was to launch North East Advanced Material Electronics, otherwise known as NEAME. NEAME is a cluster of semiconductor and advanced material electronic companies in the sector here in the northeast, based mainly at NETPark in Sedgefield. Since being elected, I have been getting to know them and I am continuing to learn about the challenges and opportunities they face which is giving me important background information for the BEIS select committee semiconductor inquiry where we are looking at supply chains, government communication and manufacturing.

On Wednesday I had the privilege of a visit to BTS Fabrications where Phil and Marcia introduced me to their fantastic business and their team. It really is a pleasure for me to be shown around a manufacturing business, having spent around 40 years working in that environment I have always liked seeing how different businesses work, particularly when they are as impressive as BTS. Thursday was a day primarily in the office where we had a number of constituents come in for surgery discussions before going out to Sedgefield delivering some leaflets and catching up with constituents. On Friday I had a meeting with the Neighbourhood Police Inspector for the north of the constituency, primarily from Thornley to the Trimdons, before discussions on the Leamside Line and how we keep it on the Government's agenda and then on the plans for our Levelling Up bid for Aycliffe Town Centre. Monday, I had a meeting with my team at Aycliffe to plan our work through the summer and how we engage with any new ministers that are put in post following the inevitable reshuffle after the leadership election concludes. We have many ways to engage, ranging from letters to ministerial surgeries but also by using adjournment debates, Westminster Hall debates, 10-minute rule bills or Oral Questions to the Department. I will explain a little about each of those in the coming weeks. ## Wildcats to Lionesses'





# **Muck Spreading**

Dear Sir,

Mrs Proud's letter, about the sickly smell, appears to point the finger at factories on the business park as the source. However, the source could also be from 'muck spreading' on farmer's fields. A lot of farmers do this during the spring but also in the summer, after harvesting. This muck can be in the form of sewage sludge, or animal manure and slurries, which fits the description of the smells given.

Industrial activities that generate an odour are controlled by legislation and therefore the regulatory bodies have enforcement powers to control them. Agricultural muck spreading falls under the best practice guidance given in the DEFRA Code of Good Agricultural Practice. Farmers are also advised that the best conditions for spreading are typically sunny, windy days, followed by cloudy, windy nights as these conditions cause odours to be diluted quickly, which could possibly explain the timings that these smells were encountered. The best way for Mrs Proud to report the issue would be to take note of the wind direction at the time of the smells in relation to her house, or keep a record of the time they occurred and report them to either The Environment Agency or Environmental Health. Who could then plot the likely sources using prevailing wind data, whether they be industrial or agricultural sites, and investigate them if necessary. Mark Penny
